Apr. 11-12, Sat. – Sun.	FIELD TRIP TO CHICAGO’S FIELD MUSEUM AND MONK PARAKEETS	Visit the Field Museum of Natural History on Saturday. On Sunday, join the field trip to hunt for Monk Parakeets. Monk parakeets are medium-sized birds in the parrot family. They originate in South America but have become established in urban areas around the world, most likely due to escape or release from pet owners. In Chicago, they were first observed in the Hyde Park neighborhood in the 1960s and have subsequently spread to surrounding areas. 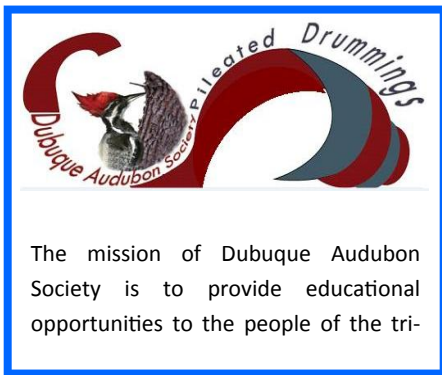
