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PRESIDENT'S CORNER

February 12th marked the first day of the Great Backyard Bird Count and 8:20 a.m. that morning found me standing in front of Swiss Valley's bird watching window with Joe Tollari counting birds. We did pretty well that morning. I counted 14 species, 49 birds in all including a Tufted Tit-Mouse and a White-breasted Nuthatch. Joe did a little better because I was running about 15 minutes late. By 9:00ish we hopped into my car and headed west to Ring-Neck Ridge to look for a Long-eared Owl that I had seen earlier in the week. We found him in a tree not too far from the parking lot. He didn't like us too much and took off almost right away, but it was still a good sighting. The fun part is on the way there we spotted a Great Horned Owl sitting in its nest just off Highway 20. We got two owls in one day during the Great Backyard Bird Count - what a hoot.

For February 13th, I attempted to count those in my backyard. Note, I said *I attempted to count*, and I did get one confirmed bird. Just as I went to the window, a Cooper's Hawk dove and made a pass at the feeders. Everything scattered, of course, and I

was able to confirm one Cooper's Hawk for the day. Then it was off to my job.

Despite the snow Sunday, I went to look for the Peregrine Falcons that were reported earlier in the week. The snow was blowing too hard to see anything, so that didn't pan out. On the upside, driving toward home on Kerper Blvd., I saw a group of 47 Robins, so I stopped and did a 15-minute count right there.

The Great Backyard Bird Count ended for me Sunday morning with another attempt at my backyard before work. Luckily, this time I timed it right and counted 14 House Finches at my feeders at one time. I think that's a record for me. I'm curious as to what cool stuff everyone else saw on the count. If you have a moment and wish to show something worth sharing, why don't you drop us a line on our Facebook page? We'd like to hear from you.

Our next meeting will be on March 10th at the usual time, 7:00p.m., at E.B. Lyons. Scott Gritters will be joining us for "Fishing over 50." A while ago we were contacted by the Carnegie Stout Library to do a intro birding class for them. (cont'd on pg 2)

GREAT BACKYARD BIRD COUNT UPDATE

As of 3:00 pm on Sunday, February 14, 2016, nine area citizens are participating in the Great Backyard Bird Count in Dubuque County. Thirty-eight checklists have been submitted representing data collected at Linwood Cemetery, Eagle Point Park, the Retention Basin, Swiss Valley Nature Center, as well as several backyards. Thirty-two species have been identified. Water fowl lead the way in numbers. High counts include:

- ◆ 375 Canada Geese
- ◆ 286 Mallards at the Retention Basin
- ◆ 47 American Robins
- ◆ 37 House Sparrows
- ◆ 34 House Finches
- ◆ 27 American Tree Sparrows (the next most numerous.)

It has been a fun weekend, but it is not over. I am looking forward to one more day of counting.
