NOVEMBER PROGRAM

The Dubuque Audubon Society is hosting a program on [Peregrine Falcons](#), [Osprey](#) and other Nongame Animals. The program will be presented by Pat Schlarbaum. Pat has been involved with nongame animals for over thirty years. Pat Schlarbaum began working for the Iowa DNR Wildlife Diversity Program in 1985. He has assisted with a number of wildlife species that include [American Kestrels](#), [Barn Owls](#), [Peregrine Falcons](#), [River Otters](#), [Bald Eagles](#), [Ospreys](#), [Greater Prairie Chickens](#) and their respective habitats. The falcon program included Bob Anderson's [Raptor Resource Project](#) work returning falcons to their native cliffs along the Mississippi River in NE Iowa. He is a recipient of the 2013 Olav Smedal Conservation award.

Pat was instrumental in the releases of Peregrine Falcons and Osprey in the tri-state area. He will provide updates on these two bird species and how they are doing on the Mississippi River and throughout their range. Pat has worked with numerous other nongame animal projects throughout Iowa and will give updates on how these animals are doing and give up dates to what is next.

THE DECORAH EAGLES UPDATE

At first I was excited when I received an e-mail message that the Decorah eagles have gone live. I expected an update on the last group of eagles. However, I was saddened to learn that Bob Anderson, Director of the Raptor Resource Project (RRP), died at the end of July. While Bob was proud of his work with the Decorah eagles, his first love and interest was in the Peregrine Falcon Recovery Program. The [Raptor Resource website](#) has a moving tribute to the man and a video outlining his work with Peregrine Falcons. He will be missed. **John Howe** is the new Director of the Raptor Resource Project.

This summer saw the demise of the second nest (N2) built by the eagles. The tree was destroyed in an early morning storm on July 18, 2015. The Raptor Resource Project team set about meeting the crisis in two ways. First, they set about finding a new nest to monitor. They found a large nest on private property north of Decorah. They are looking at adding cameras to this nest for the upcoming season. Second, they decided to do some research in nest building. Both Red-tailed Hawks and Great-horned Owls have taken over human-made "starter nests", completed the nest, and successfully raised young. In a nearby tree, the team built N2B (N2Bob). Will the eagles accept the starter nest or set about making their own new nest? Tune in to the [web site](#) for updates.
