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xploring The Mississippi Backwaters For Birds In The Fall

Dave and I had some time this weekend to scan the backwaters of the Mississippi on the Wisconsin side. We were specifically looking for migrating tundra swans and found a large grouping at Perot State Park and a few at Alma, WI. What we saw was no match for the large numbers of swans that we have observed in previous years around Harper's Ferry, IA. But seeing any number of these large white majestic birds is enjoyable.

Spotting waterfowl was an unexpected treat. We had good looks at pintails, scaups, green-winged teal, golden-eyes, gadwalls and ring-necked ducks along with our ever-present mallards and coots. These departing beauties are headed to warmer spots of open water. Already I am looking forward to their return in March as they herald the return of longer days, moderating temperatures and spring melt.

For those of us hunkering down in the tri-state area for the cold months ahead, don't be afraid to get out and look at the winter birds that remain in the area. We have a wonderful opportunity in the upcoming Christmas Bird Count; Saturday, Dec. 18 is the day to mark on your calendars. Some routes contain a lot of walking and others contain virtually no walking. Birding-by-car is the route that I do. You can spend a half-day or a full day, it's your choice. And we always end with a chili supper at the E. B. Lyons Nature Center to tally our results. To be placed on a team, call Charlie Winterwood at 563-588-2783. We always welcome additional people. More pairs of eyes means more birds counted.

2011 is the 23rd Annual Bald Eagle Watch in Dubuque. Saturday, January 15 is the date to mark on your calendar. Time is 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. at the Grand River Center in the Port of Dubuque. The Minnesota Raptor Center will be bringing an assortment of raptors, including a Bald Eagle. Pella Wildlife will also be doing programs showing a cougar and red and silver foxes. There will be additional exhibitors and vendors with many fun activities for young and old alike.

# LOCAL BIRDS OR YEAR AROUND RESIDENTS: WHAT ARE THEY? By Wayne Buchholtz

**Local -** in or related to the area that you live in, or to the particular area that you are talking about. **Birds** (**Aves**) are winged, bipedal, endothermic (warm-blooded), egg-laying, vertebrate animals. **Resident -** non migratory.

Birds that remain in Iowa throughout winter are those which can eat available seeds, dormant insects and smaller birds & mammals. They include a variety of small songbirds & woodpeckers, jays & crows, upland game birds and birds of prey. They also include some non-native birds introduced from Europe. It is difficult to categorize some bird species as winter birds; some are not consistent winterers. For example, longspurs migrate south through Iowa and, in some years, remain throughout winter. In other years however, longspurs just keep moving south. Some Iowa nesting birds normally considered to winter in the south, such as robins, occasionally remain in Iowa all winter. Ducks, geese, herons and other water birds may take up winter residence below river dams or in other areas of open water.

Some common birds found in the Dubuque area that are winter residents include the Brown Creeper and Dark-Eyed Junco.

Common bird species found in the Dubuque area that are year around residents include Northern Cardinal, Cedar Waxwing, Blue Jay, Purple Finch, American Goldfinch, Pine Siskin, Black-Capped Chickadee, Tufted Titmouse, White-Breasted Nuthatch, Robin, American Tree

Sparrow, Downy and Hairy Woodpecker, Redheaded Woodpecker, Red-Bellied Woodpecker, American Crow, Mourning Dove, House (English) Sparrow, European Starling, Wild Turkey, Ring-Necked Pheasant, Eastern Screech Owl, Barred Owl, Great Horned Owl, Red-tailed Hawk, Sharp-shinned Hawk and the Bald Eagle.

So you can see that most birds we see in our area during the winter are local residents. Most birds we see in the fall are migrating through to get to their winter homes.

To feed birds this winter, use black oiled sunflower seeds, nyger, suet and water. You should bring in a good variety of birds depending on where you live. To see those owls and raptors, you will need to visit a local wildlife area. Have fun birding and remember to bring family and friends with you. You never know when you will see that once in a life time bird.


