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CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT

It was the cold morning of December 29th, but I barely noticed the weather. It was time for the thing I had been looking forward to all year, the Christmas Bird Count. As I drove to E.B. Lyons with my dad and grandpa, I looked out my window trying to find a few species to put on my list before the big day started. When we arrived we went into the Nature Center to get warmed up and also get paired into groups. Once we were in groups, we could head out and get on the move before the owls went to sleep, and the daytime birds woke up.

This year I got paired up with my dad and grandpa to do the river route downtown. Our first stop was Mt. Carmel. We walked slowly out of the car hoping not to spook any owls that were still up. Though we did not see any owls, we still found crows, starlings, tree sparrows, eagles, and a brown creeper. We had other great sightings throughout our day, like when we went to the 16th Street Detention Basin and saw a Pintail, a Wood Duck and a Hooded Merganser. We also went to Maus Park and saw a Winter Wren and an Eastern Bluebird.

Throughout the day we stopped at a lot of cool places and had many good sightings.





OTHER NEST CAMERAS

It looks like the Decorah eagles will be using the new nest this year. Unfortunately, the new nest does not have any cameras set up. We may all be experiencing eagle cam withdrawal! You can go to Google or Ustream.tv and find other eagle nest sites, but the video quality may not be as good as Decorah. Not to worry. Here are two of my favorite alternative sites.



If you are interested in hummingbirds, you can go to www.ustream.tv/hummingbirdnestcam. There you can watch the adventures of Phoebe, a Channel Island Allen hummingbird, as she lays and incubates the eggs and raises the young to fledging. Since she is a small bird, she does all of this in a short period of time. In fact, she will probably have 3 or 4 more clutches before June.



The other site(www.ustream.tv/channel/peacheyroo) is not a nest cam. The camera scans various areas of a backyard in eastern Australia. Sulfur-crested Cockatoos, Galahs, Red-browed Finches, Whiteheaded Pigeons, and House Sparrows abound. You never know what is going to show up. There is a time difference, but, you can tune in midmorning and find some action.

THE 2013 GREAT BACKYARD BIRD COUNT (GBBC)

The 2013 GBBC will take place Friday, February 15, through Monday, February 18, 2013. This is the 16th annual count. The Great Backyard Bird Count is an annual 4-day event that engages bird watchers of all ages in counting birds to create a real-time snapshot of where the birds are. Everyone is welcome--from beginning bird watchers to experts. It takes as little as 15 minutes on one day, or you can count for as long as you like each day of the event. It's free, fun, and easy and it helps the birds. You simply watch birds at your feeders or any location you wish to count. You watch the feeders and adjoining areas for at least fifteen minutes. Tally up the numbers of each species you see. You will want to count all the birds you see at one time. Keep counting and record the highest number of each species you see within the fifteen minutes. When you are done counting, report your results on online. Go to www.BirdCount.org to record your list. It is just that simple. And the best thing is you can go to other areas to report multiple counts. Just remember to count for only fifteen minutes and record the highest number of each species seen. I count each day at my backyard feeders. I also count at Swiss Valley Nature Center and E.B. Lyons Interpretive Center.

Beginning in 2013, each participant must set up a free GBBC account to submit their checklists. You'll only need to do this once to participate in all future GBBC events. As the count progresses, anyone with Internet access can explore what is being reported from their own towns or from anywhere in the world.

Scientists and bird enthusiasts can learn a lot by knowing where the birds are. Bird populations are dynamic; they are constantly in flux. No single scientist or team of scientists could hope to document and understand the complex distribution and movements of so many species in such a short time. Scientists use the GBBC information, along with observations from other citizen-science projects, such as the Christmas Bird Count, Project FeederWatch, and eBird, to get the "big picture" about what is happening to bird populations. The longer these data are collected, the more meaningful they become in helping scientists investigate far-reaching questions.

Try out this fun bird watching activity. If you want company, join me at Swiss Valley Nature Center on Friday, February 15 (about 8:00 am) or E.B. Lyons Interpretive Center on Monday, February 18 (again about 8:00 am).
