PRESIDENT'S CORNER

On November 9th, Olivia, Dad, and I spent the morning birding between Savanna, Illinois, and lock and Dam 13 in Fulton. If you've never been there before, it's loaded with birding opportunities. Generally, when we make this run we start at the Sabula Lakes and then head east across the Mississippi, then south towards Spring Lake. From there, we work the river edges until we end at the Lock and Dam. On this particular trip, we were lucky



enough to run into a large wave of migrating ducks and swans. All along the Mississippi we found just about every dabbling duck possible. A dabbler is a duck that feeds by upending from the surface of the water. We saw Eagles, a Eurasian Tree Sparrow, and a ton of Coots. The most impressive sight was at the Spring Lake parking lot where we ran into about a thousand Tundra

Swans fattening up for their flight south for the winter; the horizon was white with them. Closest to us there were even a couple of Trumpeter Swans mixed in.

Trumpeter Swans versus Tundra Swans from a distance and without hearing them, how do you tell what is what? This is what I asked myself while standing in that parking lot looking at all the big white birds in the distance. If I look in my Peterson's Field Guide, this is what it tells me: the Trumpeter Swan is larger than the Tundra Swan; they both have all black bills, but the Tundra Swan may have a small yellow basal spot between the bird's bill and eye. The Tundra Swan's bill's lores are black and form a "V" whose point leads into the bird's eve. Another fantastic tool that I have found for researching birds and comparing similar species is Cornell Lab of Ornithology's "All about Birds" site on the internet, http:// www.allaboutbirds.org. All I have to do is go to the website, type in "Tundra Swan," and it pulls up pages of information on the bird. It shows me identification tips, range maps, eating habits, cool facts, and more. Possibly my favorite feature is the fact that you can click on a tab called "similar birds" and it will show you a side-by-side comparison of the two birds with a breakdown of their differences. This was the first thing I did when we got back from

the first thing I did when we got back from our trip down south to double check my findings.

This year marks the hundredth anniversary of the death of the last passenger pigeon, and Dubuque Audubon's next meeting will have a speaker on this very subject. The meeting is Thursday, December 11th, at 7:00 p.m. in the E.B. Lyons Auditorium. January 3rd will be our Christmas Bird Count, and January 17th brings Dubuque's annual Bald Eagle Watch.

We've got a lot of fun things lined up for the end of this year and the start of next year, and we hope to see you there.
