So, I glanced in the other driver's direction and recognized John and Leeta Miller who you all know are long term members of Dubuque Audubon and friends of mine. They got out of their car, and while doing a little birding around the parking lot, they told me they were on their way to Potosi to meet a friend for lunch and do a little birding at the Potosi Recreational Area. stood there for a minute, scratched my head and admitted I'd never heard of the place. They told me there is a boat landing there on a peninsula that's maybe a quarter mile long -marsh on both sides all the way. They've done some pretty sightings there. So, the next day I had off work I took off toward Potosi.

Since then, I've made the forty-minute trip to that boat landing at least once a week. It's a lot smaller than Green Island, and you won't see quite as much, but it has some charms of its own.



On my first trip I ran into a ton of waterfowl that were migrating up the river. I bet I saw almost every duck species that comes through the area in one sitting.

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PILEATED DRUMMINGS

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On my third trip up there, I was near the boat landing when I stopped to watch some Buffleheads that were swimming near the side of the road. Then to my surprise, I looked to my right, and there was a Pileated Woodpecker working the base of a tree not twenty-five feet away from my car!! I rolled down my window and must have taken fifty pictures.

We didn't get to see the Pileated, but we stopped in almost the same spot and watched two Sandhill Cranes that were standing about thirty feet away. They didn't like us too much and spent a lot of the time we were there scolding us. I took a ton of pictures of them, too. We also got to see a Mute Swan that day. So, if you have a free afternoon this spring, then take a ride to Potosi and check out the boat landing. It's an easy drive, and you don't even have to get out of your car if you want. Drop us a line on Facebook, and let us know what you saw. Until then, I'll see you in the field.

• Potosi Recreation Area, or the "Potosi Point" as it is known locally, is a narrow finger of land extending .6 miles into the Mississippi river. Visitors can enjoy bird watching from a Bird Viewing Platform or watch boats or a barge make their way on the river. Over 270 species of land birds and waterfowl have been observed, including eagles, snow geese, American pelicans and swans. Or enjoy shore fishing or use the boat ramp if you want to take your boat out to do some fishing. We are Wisconsin's Catfish Capital!
