I love May. There is so much going on that I have material for a dozen President Corners but very little time to sit down and write it. I just got a text from Tony that there is a Snowy Egret at Deere, and I'm using a lot of willpower not to run out the door to see it. Things are happening. Three weeks ago we had Dubuque Audubon's spring birding trip to the Schlitz Audubon Center in Milwaukee. We started out that Saturday morning in Potosi and birded our way across the state until we reached our hotel in Milwaukee. The next morning we met up with a group of volunteers at the Schlitz Center and birded for the next five hours around the property. After getting a personal tour of the center itself, we headed to Lake Michigan where we watched mergansers, terns, and gulls fly across the backdrop of the endless waters. That afternoon we birded our way to Dubuque. It was a fun weekend, we made some new friends, and we saw seventy-eight species of birds.

Saturday, May 13th was our Spring Bird Count. It was a fun-filled day. Eighteen birders from Dubuque Audubon split up and covered the tri -state area counting all of the bird species they could find. At the end of the day we met up at Swiss Valley Park, cooked up some brats and tallied up our counts for the day. We had an impressive 148 species! The thing I love most about the Spring Bird Count is that during migration there are so many species around that everybody seems to be able to contribute a sighting that the others didn't get to see. Every set of eyes is important. Among the noteworthy sighting are: Bob Walton's group saw a Little Gull, Tony Moline got Short-billed Dowitchers, Maggie O'Connell's group saw a Least Bittern and Charlie Winterwood's group saw a Golden-winged Warbler. I think everyone had a good day.

May is the end of our programing year for Dubuque Audubon, but that doesn't mean the fun is ending. We have all summer to look forward to before we resume meeting for next year's programs in October. SPRING SPECIES COUNT 2017

We had great weather for the 2017 Spring Species Count. A cool, dry morning gave way to a warm (but not hot) afternoon. High water on the river meant that we did not see the numbers of shore birds that are usual for this area, but the warblers were in abundance. The group recorded 147 species of birds.
