Beginning Birding Series

Join Dubuque Audubon Society for its Beginning Birding Series at Swiss Valley Nature Center! Whether you are just getting introduced into birding for the first time or are looking to brush up on some of your skills, these classes are the perfect addition to any birder's toolkit! Sign up for one class or join us for all of them! Space is limited to twelve participants per class. Children under 12 years old must be accompanied by an adult. Binoculars and field guides will be provided, but feel free to bring your own. Call 563-556-6745 to register.

All classes will be held from 9:00am-11:00am at the Swiss Valley Nature Center. There will be a short classroom portion before we trek into the field and put our skills to the test.

Saturday, April 14th - What You Need

The first class will go over the basics of what tools you will need to start your birding adventures. We will give you some tips and tricks on using binoculars to track birds. We will also recommend some of our favorite field guides and places in the area to go birding.

Saturday, April 28th – Identifying Birds

This class will cover some of the most common birds you may see in the field. One of the keys to identification is being able to pick out which family that bird may belong. We will cover some basic bird

anatomy and how it differs among families. We will also look at the habitats these different families might be found.

Saturday, May 12th – no class held but Spring Bird Count invitation

There will be no class held this week but we invite you to attend Audubon's Annual Spring Bird Count to put your newfound birding skills to the test. We will be meeting at the north entrance of Eagle Point Park at 8:00am. This event is great for beginning bird watchers. Experienced bird watchers will help to locate and identify resident and migrating birds. Bring binoculars and dress for the weather.

Saturday, May 26th – In the Field

This class will be an extension on the previous class with the majority of our time in the field using the skills we've learned thus far. We will also be going more in-depth on field markings and identification by bird calls.

Saturday, June 9th – The Birdlist

Every good birde r has THE list. We will show different resources you can use to keep a record of birds you've seen, apps that work well for identification, and the eBird website. Each participant will receive a comprehensive list of birds found in Dubuque County to get started. We will then venture outside to see how many we can check off this list!

April Program: Spring in the Downunder of Southeastern Australia & Tasmania

This program will feature photos taken by Maggie O'Connell and Sandy Walton during their recent trip to one of the most beautiful avifaunas in the world. Australia is home to some 776 species of birds of which over 300 are endemic. They encountered birds wearing a dazzling rainbow of shades of blue, red, green, and purple. It is also home to the greatest number of reptiles found anywhere and marsupials such as kangaroos, koalas, echidnas, wombats, and the Tasmanian Devil. There are challenges for the varied ecosystems of Australia. The threats to Eucalyptus forests, saltbush flats and mallee habitats presented by human activity and introduced plant and animal species will be discussed.
