#### **OCTOBER BIG DAY**



Every year for the last four years Global Big Day has set new heights for a single day of birding. This massively international collaborative birding

event has been so great we want to have another worldwide eBird Big Day in October. Why October? Because spring is rejuvenating the southern hemisphere and the northern reaches of the world are in the midst of migration. No matter where you are, we're confident you can find some great birds on 6 October. Let's see what we can find together on the first October Big Day!

#### How to participate

- Get an eBird account: eBird is a worldwide bird checklist program used by hundreds of thousands of birders. It's what allows us to compile everyone's sightings into a single massive October Big Day list while at the same time collecting the data for scientists to use to better understand birds. Sign up here. It's free.
- Watch birds on 6 October: Even 10 minutes in your backyard counts.
- Enter what you see and hear in eBird: You can enter your sightings via our website or—even easier—download the free eBird Mobile app. While you're downloading free apps, try out the Cornell Lab's Merlin Bird ID app for help with identification.

#### Watch the sightings roll in.

This is the first October Big Day—our chance to set a benchmark for the future. Can we get 5,000 species from 125 countries for the inaugural event? No matter what you do, have fun, enjoy the birds you find, and share your sightings on eBird. Because in our world, every bird counts.

## The Big Sit/Hawk Watch 2018

Audubon's 4<sup>th</sup> annual "Big Sit". A Big Sit is a birding event where you bird watch from a given area (usually a circle) for a given mount of time. Our circle is always the circle around Julien Dubuque's Grave. Someone must always be inside the circle or the event automatically ends. Also, all birds must be seen from inside the circle. For example, Tony Moline saw a Hooded Warbler partway down the trail. I was in the circle, and my view was obstructed and didn't see it so that bird couldn't count on the day's total. We've

always had good raptor viewing during the event, so we decided to combine the Big Sit with our annual Hawk Watch this year. Instead of listing every bird we saw like we usually do, I thought it might be fun to contribute a few of my notes from the day that I had jotted down.

**4:50 am**: We set up camp at the Julien Dubuque Monument. It's still very dark out and very quiet.

**5:18 am**: Tony drove down to the bottom of the hill to call for Screech Owls while I stayed in the circle. After being interrupted by a barge and a train I heard one calling back in the distance. 1<sup>st</sup> bird of the day!

**5:25am**: Second bird of the day is a female Great Horned Owl calling from south of the monument.

**6:15am**: After repeated unsuccessful attempts to call one a Barred Owl has started calling on without prompting. It continues to call occasionally for a half a hour before quitting. The sun is starting to show itself.

**6:18am**: We hear the call of a nearby House Wren. Jim Olsen also spots a Wood Duck as it's flying over.

6:19am: A nearby eagle calls.

**6:26am**: 6 Ring-billed Gulls grace us with a flyby **6:50am**: The woodpeckers wake us and come to visit. Within a few minutes we are visited by a Pileated, Down and Redbellied Woodpeckers.

**7:04am**: A dozen species of warblers explode into the scene. There are so many of them and they are moving so much that they are hard to identify in the morning light. Included are: Magnolia, Black-throated Green, Nashville, Yellow-throated Warblers and others.

Eighty-three people visited us during the day. We begin at 5:00 AM and ended at 6:30 PM. We viewed **79 species** including: 3 species of owls, 19 species of warbler, all of the woodpeckers that can be found in the area, and lots of hawks, flycatchers and songbirds. Make sure you look for the event again next September and join us for part of the day.
