As summer approaches, we will take a break from our usual activities. regular monthly meetings are suspended until September, but that is not going to stop us from bird We have one organized watching. bird hike. On Saturday, June 8, we will meet at 8:00 a.m. in the parking lot of E. B. Lyons Interpretive Center to carpool or car caravan to the newly acquired addition to the White Water Canyon Preserve. Brian Preston, Executive Director of the Dubuque County Conservation Board, will lead the tour of the Valentine property. We will be looking for grassland birds especially Bobolinks and Grasshopper Sparrows. Should be a fun morning. But birding takes place all summer. Some people keep their feeders going

year-round and enjoy the birds that come to their feeders. Two birding hot spots are the John Deere Marsh and Green Island Conservation Area. You would probably find the greatest diversity of birds in these two areas. Mines of Spain and Swiss Valley Nature Preserve have both woodland and grassland habitats and offer great birding, along with White Water Canyon Preserve. Or, perhaps, you want to sit in the shade of the screened porch at the Dubuque Arboretum and watch hummingbirds jostling for position at the feeders. There are always opportunities to watch birds.

We will also participate in the North Butterfly American Association's Fourth of July Butterfly Count. This year the count will begin at 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, July 13, 2019, at both E. B. Lyons Interpretive Center and Swiss Valley Nature Center. This is another fun, outdoor activity for families.

We will resume our regular monthly meetings in September. See you at the potluck on Thursday, September 12<sup>th</sup>.

### PILEATED DRUMMINGS

## **SPRING SPECIES COUNT 2019**

The delayed spring and high water levels made for an interesting spring migration. The total count (142 species) was not much different from previous years nor was the list of species observed. There were not as many shore birds as usual, but then with the high water, there wasn't much shore! What was unusual was the number of birds of a species we saw. For example, if we see a flock of 15 to 20 Black Terns, then we are having a good day. This year, there were hundreds in one flock. We might see 4 or 5 Eastern Kingbirds in a day. This year, we saw groups of 10 to 15. But the most surprising were the Scarlet Tanagers. Normally, we are lucky to see one tanager in the top of a tree. This year, they were all over in large numbers at feeders, working the bottom of a chain link fence, at the water's edge. These are not places where we normally see Scarlet Tanagers. It was memorable day. Here is a list of the species observed.
