
PRESIDENT'S CORNER

September 14th Saturday	MONARCH TAGGING	10:00 AM - noon. Whitewater Canyon Wildlife Area, Bernard, IA. Learn about one of the world's most talked about butterflies and what makes them so unique! We will also try our hand at catching and tagging monarchs as they migrate to their winter home in Mexico. Come prepared to move around and have some fun! FREE. No registration required.
September 22nd Sunday	FRIENDS OF DCCB CHILI FEED	11:00 AM -2:00 PM. Swiss Valley Nature Center, 13606 Swiss Valley Rd, Peosta. Help support the work of the Friends of Dubuque County Conservation by coming to their Annual Chili Feed! There will be music and wagon rides through the preserve (weather permitting). Tickets will be sold at the door \$7.00 for adults and \$4.00 for kids 12 and under. Tickets can be bought from Friends board members for a discounted rate prior to the event.
September 14th, 21st, & 28th Saturdays	MONARCH TAGGING	1:00 - 2:00 PM. Hurstville Interpretive Center, 18670 63rd Street, Maquoketa. What lives only eight months, migrates over 2,000 miles, and spends the winter in Mexico? It's the monarch butterfly. Join Jackson County Conservation naturalists in learning about the monarch's journey south for the winter every Saturday in September. After a short presentation about monarchs, we'll grab some nets and head to the prairie to catch and tag this year's migrants. Program is free and all ages are welcome!
October 5th Saturday	PLOGGING AT THE CAVES	1:00 - 3:00 PM. Hurstville Interpretive Center, 18670 63rd Street, Maquoketa. Join Naturalist Tony Vorwald as we hike the trails at the park, pick up litter, get some exercise, and help the caves!
October 7th Monday	MISSISSIPPI RIVER FALL LEAF FLOAT	9:00 AM – 2:00 PM. Hosted by Swiss Valley Nature Center. We will start at A.Y. McDonald Park and float down along the Mississippi River enjoying the scenic views to end our float at Massey Marina Park. This is approximately a 9 mile float. The float is scheduled near the peak of the fall leaf color and we should have great views of the river and surrounding foliage. Naturalists will share information on leaves, how they change color and why they drop. Contact the Nature Center for more info.
